



Migrant 101 Trainings

Options Available

Consider the best model for your district needs. To schedule training for your staff, please contact one of our ESD Migrant Ed Coordinators.

Option A

Staff attend a 1.5 hour Migrant 101 training. This training will be highly engaging and will include district and state data, student voice, Seven Areas of Concern, and Funds of Knowledge. Interactive games, that are adaptable for classroom use, will be included so that staff can test their knowledge while learning new information.

Option B

Staff attend a 1 hour training. This training will include district and state data, Basics of Migrant Education, Seven Areas of Concern, and Funds of Knowledge.

Option C

Staff attend 2-3 thirty minute sessions. This option can accommodate Options A or B by breaking them into shorter sessions.






